

We help fund a political action committee (BikePAC) that directly interacts with the legislature about motorcycles issues and bills that affect us.

What does "A.B.A.T.E." mean?

A.B.A.T.E. stands for A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments. The organization was formed when legislators passed bills adversely affecting riders without consulting them.

We also do business as A Brotherhood Aimed Towards Education.

A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon, Inc. promotes motorcycle awareness, education, safety, and liberty through community involvement and legislative action.

What is BikePAC?

Founded in 1988, BikePAC members track legislation, brief officials, and report to A.B.A.T.E. about issues affecting motorcyclists.

A.B.A.T.E. and BikePAC Legislative Victories

- 1977 Oregon helmet requirement repealed.
- 1979 Rider safety program proposed by A.B.A.T.E.
- 1981 Team Oregon rider safety legislation passed.
- 1988 Voter referendum reinstates helmet require-
 - BikePAC formed for motorcyclists' legislative efforts.
- 1995 Motorcycle helmet definition standardized. (HB-3422)
- 1997 Adult helmet freedom of choice bill passed, vetoed by governor.
- 1997 Federal court equates federal testing standards with Oregon helmet definition.

- 1999 Motorcycle handlebar height regulation repealed.
- 2001 Riders given choice to fuel bikes at service stations. (HB-3885)

2001-2013

Hostile capitol environment to motorcycle legislative efforts.

- **2015** "*Dead Red*" bill passes. (SB-533) Riders allowed to proceed if light not triggered after one cycle.
- 2017 Reckless drivers held accountable for motorcyclist harm. (HB-2598)
- 2019 Drivers can be held criminally negligent for motorcycist injuries. (SB-810)

Legislators didn't give motorcyclists these victories. We had to work hard together to gain or regain our rights.








Vision Defeats Terrorism

festivals and renfaires

(Personal views of the editor. Not to be confused with reality or endorsement by A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon.)



But as life experiences, awareness, and world events expanded, so did the significance of the ninth month of our calendar. Adulthood opened up Oktoberfest celebrations while Talk-Like-A-Pirate Day let kids of all ages speak and growl with a Cornwall accent.

Then came the twenty-first century when September was given an enduring stigma by terrorists seeking to make statements using the lives of themselves and far too many others.

Yer crusty ol' editor was just over the half century mark when the events of 9-11 unfolded.

He remembers the disbelief, the fear of further attacks, the quiet skies lacking airliner contrails.

Missing from his memories are any discussions about the date of the attacks and the significance of the targets chosen:

- 9-11 is similar to the emergency telephone number for police, firefighters and ambulances.
- The world trade center represented the **financial** policies of the nation.
- The Pentagon stood for the U.S. military-industrial complex.
- A third intended target was the Washington D.C. capitol building, symbolizing the political arm of the country.

Focus was thrown onto finding out who was responsible for planning the attacks, then seeking revenge on them.

Citizen freedoms were sacrificed with passage of the U.S.A. P.A.T.R.I.O.T. Act^* , a contrived acronym designed to generate reluctant support for removing constitutional rights. ("It's still warm," commented one legislator of the huge, rapidly-printed document suggesting that it had been waiting in the wings for just such an opportunity.)

If the goal of the terrorists had been to bring down the United States because it was evil, they utterly failed because the underlying vision that guides the U.S. culture remained intact.

Instead they attempted to draw attention to a national power triad that is often abused by self-interest. That effort was overshadowed by nearhysterical political and media reaction to the attacks.

About the only successes the 9-11 terrorists can claim is that they made everyday life a bit more difficult for those traveling by airlines and citizens lost civil rights that many people in the world have never known.

But at least we're not likely to be paddled now days if we play while wearing our school clothes.

As remarked earlier, September is a time of festivals, with or without pirate-speak. And ya ain't ridden a bike in leathers until you've ridden one wearing lederhosen.

In Oregon, the most significant Oktoberfest takes place in Mt Angel, September. The downtown area takes on a Bavarian air with food booths, three beer gardens, and on-going entertainment. Parking can be a problem for cagers, but two-wheelers can probably find small parking spots near the

downtown area.

But that's not the only Oktoberfest in Oregon. Other towns or cities with such festivals are: Portland and Ridgefield-09 Sept; Klamath - 21 Sept; Yachats –27-29 Sept; Joseph – 28 Sept -01 Oct; Forest Grove, Cottage Grove, and Canyon City - 28 Sept; Bend; Jacksonville.

A special type of festival is the renaissance faire (RenFaire), of which Shrewsbury showcases the best of medieval England right here in Oregon's Kings Valley, 14-15 September.

There are knights jousting on horseback, blacksmiths pounding glowing metal, ale in tankards, and turkey legs to nosh on as you stroll around the grounds. You can even rent or buy a cloak and other garb to fit in more, though it's not a requirement. (Biker leathers are already pretty medieval.) You may find that lots of the craft objects for sale fit in nicely with motorcycling.

Get out and do some September adventuring before the rains return.



During the second world war, Korea, and Viet Nam, field rations for ground troops on the move often consisted of packages containing specially canned food.

There were a variety of menus, each individual meal consisting of a main course, biscuits or bread, dessert, and accessories that included cigarettes, matches, John Wayne can opener, etc.

Although the style of C-rats contents and packaging changed down through the wars, battlefields often remained littered with empty food cans. (Willy and Joe cartoon: They're walking through a battered landscape littered with war debris when they come upon a British soldier who complains, "You Yanks sure leave a messy battle field.")

Canned rations proved to be unwieldy during hot muggy combat in southeast Asia during the 1960s and early '70s.

A new style of combat ration was developed that relied on vacuumed-sealed heavy duty plastic foil packaging for individual food items. Meals consisted of individual packets grouped together into a large heavy-duty plastic bag that was lighter and less bulky than earlier canned rations. They were dubbed, "Meal, Ready-To-Eat", or MRE.

and free shipping. (Plus they often throw in extra food packs with yer order.) You can save considerable money by purchasing a case rather than individual meals. Chapters might consider case purchases to save their members some bucks that can be better spent on gas fer riding. Sometimes the cases are on sale, which saves even more greenbacks.

One company that contracts to make MREs for the government now offers a civilian version under the name, MRE Star.

One work of caution though. The long shelf life of MREs is often achieved with high levels of salt. So if you need to cut back on sodium intake, some MRE foods may not be good for you.

Fortunately every MRE food item is well documented with nutritional information so you can make decisions about what works best for your situation.

And by the way, apparently MRE #10 (chill and macaroni) is the most prized meal of the 24 menus available. It's in the "A" case or is available individually.


There is not much to report from Oregon. Our BikePAC lobbyist is out on the fire line fighting forest fires and wildfires.

IT IS HEREBY ADJUDGED AND DECLARED that Oregon House Bill 3422 means that as long as a motorcycle rider is wearing a protective covering on his head that has a hard outer shell, padding adjacent to and inside the outer shell and a chin-strap retention system with a sticker indicating that the motorcycle helmet meets standards established by the United States Department of Transportation the rider is in compliance with state law with respect to his helmet and a police officer may not inquire further to determine if the helmet worn meets United States Department of Transportation testing standards.




