WHAT'S HAPPENING IN SALEM???

ABATE has five bills in various stages of being introduced into the House of Representatives. As of this date, the first week of February, we do not have bill numbers. As soon as we know the numbers, chapter officers will announce it in a meeting, and we will publish the text in the next newsletter. Here are summaries:

- 1. Requires the same license indorsement for one who drives a moped as one who drives a motorcycle. Makes one who drives a moped meet the same reqirements to obtain indorsement as one who drives a motorcycle.
- 2. Permits one 15 years of age or older to apply for an instructional permit with a motorcycle indorsement. Indorsed permit allows one to learn to drive a motorcycle on roads for one year. Permit holder must not carry a passenger, and must ride in the company and under the supervision of a licensed operator or chauffeur at least 18 years of age.
- Permits schools to offer a course on motorcycle operator training. Permits schools to obtain funds for the course in same manner as schools do for course on auto driver's training.
- 4. Includes motorcycle headlight in the list of offenses defined as "non-moving" violations. In other words, it would be regarded as an equipment violation rather than a moving violation, if your headlight fails. This could be beneficial when it comes to paying your insurance; at present, a ticket for a headlight failure puts a point on your insurance record.

Includes motorcycles in a section of the law that deals with moped turn signals.

Present law says that, if a moped is not equipped with turn signals, the operator may use hand signals.

The first three bills will probably be assigned to the House Transportation Committee. Our lobbyist, James Ashley (Rusty Nail) has been in touch with the Chairman and Vice-chairman of that committee, and both are interested and enthusiastic about these bills. We are getting a good reception from legislators, and it looks like they are willing to work with us.

ABATE'S LOBBYIST

ABATE's registered lobbyist for the 1981 session is James Ashley, better known to most of us as Rusty Nail. He is going to Salem once or twice a week from his home in Eugene, and spending a lot of time trying to graft his ear to a telephone. ABATE is paying for his gas, but beyond that he is a volunteer. Rusty also represents Disabled Veterans of America, and is getting around the capitol building in his wheelchair. He reports that he is getting a good welcome from a number of legislators, and that there is a lot of interest in our bills.

We want Rusty to know how much we appreciate his time and efforts on behalf of ABATE, and that without him, these bills would be having a pretty slow go of it.

Senate Bill 30 SUMMARY: "Extends insurance coverage required for motor vehicles to mopeds and motorcycles."

EXPLANATION: Present Oregon law requiring "no-fault" liability insurance on automobiles specifically excludes mopeds and motorcycles. Insurance requirements for mopeds and motorcycles include liability coverage for passengers, pedestrians, other vehicles and property, but DO NOT include medical, funeral, or disability income coverage for the insured person (the operator).

SB 30 will require that you buy a minimum amount of medical, funeral and disability coverage for yourself IN ADDITION TO WHAT YOU ARE ALREADY REQUIRED TO CARRY. SB 30 DOES NOT mean that your automobile insurance would cover your motorcycle!

Motorcyclists in other states have opposed such legislation because of the high cost of the premiums. Insurance companies don't want to insure motorcyclists because they believe it is a high risk; so if this insurance becomes mandatory, premiums will be much higher than they already are.

WHERE TO WRITE: SB 30 is in the Senate Insurance, Banking, and Retirement Committee. Address your letters to the Chairman. Additional letters may be written to individual members of the Committee.

Senate Bill 185 SUMMARY: "Requires a person under the age of 18 years to take a driving course in order to get a license. Takes effect on July 1, 1982."

EXPLANATION: With certain exceptions as defined in ORS 482.160 (special licenses) an operator's or chauffeur's license shall not be issued to any person under the age of 18 year. An operator's license may be issued to any person who attains the age of 16 years and successfully completes an approved driver education course. In other words, persons between the ages of 16 and 18 have to pass a driver training course if they want a driver's license. This bill applies only to automobile driver's licenses; of course, in order to get a motorcycle endorsement you must first have a driver's license.

This bill in the long run could have very positive effects on the number of accidents (and tickets) chalked up by the young, inexperienced driver. Just as with motorcycles, inexperienced operators tend to have more accidents than other drivers, and proper training can help reduce those accidents. This could also benefit motorcyclists if the driver education course contains training in driver awareness of motorcycles.



On January 25, representatives from and the AMA got together to talk about legislation. Present were Roger Hendricks, Kane Taylor, and Preacher Jim McLucas from Portland, Teresa Hepker and Brian Stovall for River City (The Dalles) for ABATE; Herb Seaver, AMA District 28 President; Chuck Washburn, AMA District 27 President; Marcia Washburn, Marv Estes, Dale Allin, and John Goff, all from Dist. 27.

The AMA folks have come up with a bill very similar to SB789 (the rider education bill that failed in the last legislative session), which will be introduced in the Oregon Senate. It covers rider education and licensing, and includes detail on funding, course content, and instructor qualifications, subjects not defined in the ABATE'S bills this term.

During the three or four hours of the meeting, both groups expressed surprise and pleasure at the similarities in the bills being written, and interest in forming a coalition to work in the 1981 legislative session. Discussion of SB 30 led to formation of the opinion that the bill would make insurance very expensive, and that the bill might not be in the best interests of motorcyclists. It was also mentioned that persons with medical insurance policies through their jobs are already covered and don't necessarily need to buy more.

A second meeting is scheduled for Feb. 22, to discuss progress of the bills, other legislation, and ways to cooperate in lobbying and presenting testimony at hearings.
