- 1977 Oregon helmet requirement repealed.
- **1979** Rider safety program proposed by A.B.A.T.E.
- 1981 Team Oregon rider safety legislation passed.
- 1988 Voter referendum reinstates helmet requirement.
 - BikePAC formed for motorcyclists' legislative efforts.
- **1995** Motorcycle helmet definition standardized. (HB- 3422)
- 1997 Adult helmet freedom of choice bill passed, vetoed by governor.
- 1997 Federal court equates federal testing standards with Oregon helmet definition.
- 1999 Motorcycle handlebar height regulation repealed.

- **2001** Riders given choice to fuel bikes at service stations. (HB-3885)
- 2001-2013 Hostile capitol environment to motorcycle legislative efforts.
- **2015** "*Dead Red*" bill passes. (SB-533) Riders allowed to proceed if light not triggered after one cycle.
- 2017 Reckless drivers held accountable for motor-cyclist harm. (HB-2598)
- 2019 Drivers can be held criminally negligent for motorcycist injuries. (SB–810)
- **2019** Lane sharing bill didn't pass.
 - Lane sharing bill vetoed by governor.
- 2023 Lane sharing bill died in house transportation committee.

Sanctioning officer – Jimmy Kasner had nothing to report. He is not not seeking any office next year and is going to step back to focus and family and his band.

Old Business

• Joy said she has had several states who want to host next year's *P.N.F.R.* event. And some in the meeting asked how much we lost or made. Or if we have it next year. Also the date as a holiday weekend was a point of concern with the low turnout and the conflict with several other events going on at the same time a short distance away.

Jack said that Joy had limited time to get some of the behind-thescenes decisions made and that she violated no rules by handling the event.

The low turnout topic turned into a talk of how we, A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon is failing due to lack our own members supporting or attending own own local or state functions.

And the subject of our current state officership having more vacancies than filled positions.

[BikePAC?] The topic of having to make a hard look at deciding to fold if we don't get some folks in offices and make an effort by October's board meeting. We need to use the October planning session into [BikePAC's possible] dissolution to figure out how to disperse the funds.

- Karen pointed out we are behind with the nominations for 2026 to piggy back on Jack's comments. She also added that currently *BikePAC* consists of her and Paula, which doesn't even meet the legal requirements to function.
- Brian Stoval stood up and let the members know that as a founding member of *BikePAC*, and that "*Everything has a shelf life. And* BikePAC *has had its*" then suggested *BikePAC* be dissolved.

A.M.A. Attends Global F.I.M. Seminar

annual event provides collaborative forum for federation and continental union leaders

Representatives from the American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.)Fédération and Internationale de Motocyclisme (F.I.M.)–North America F.I.M.participated in the secretaries general meeting in England, Oxford, 15-16 September, where they shared ideas on advancing the sport with motorcycle federations and continental unions (ConU) from around the world.

"In many ways, motorcycling is a universal language, and the challenges we face and the solutions to those challenges are similar worldwide, making these collaborative meetings essential to our mission," said A.M.A. president and CEO, Rob Dingman, who also is president of F.I.M.—N.A. "We appreciate the F.I.M.'s efforts organizing this event and we extend our heartfelt thanks to England's federation, the Auto-Cycle Union, for being such a generous and gracious host."

The A.M.A. is the F.I.M.-affiliated national federation representing the United States. The A.M.A., along with the Canadian Motorcycle Association and Barbados Motoring Federation, make up F.I.M.-N.A., one of six F.I.M. continental unions that organize motorcycling activity around the globe.

"While in terms of activity the A.M.A. is among the largest federations in the world, we are relatively selective with respect to the events and disciplines run under our ConU banner of F.I.M.—N.A.," said F.I.M.—N.A. secretary

general, James Holter, who also serves as the A.M.A. chief operating officer. "However, with the announcement of recent sanctions, including the F.I.M.—N.A. Arenacross Continental Championship, we are expanding our calendar. The advice and consultation with other ConUs are critical as we chart the future of F.I.M.—N.A."

National federation and ConU secretaries general presented at the event, covering topics such as insurance challenges and solutions, off-highway access, environmental impact, opportunities and trends in recreational riding, volunteer management, international rider licensing, and issues surrounding unsanctioned and often unsafe events. Representatives also activity submitted reports, previewed calendar expansions, and discussed advancements in governance.

"Seeing old problems through a new lens is helpful as we work with stakeholders in the United States to improve how we do business as a community of riders, officials, and organizers here, from rule making to rider benefits to technical solutions to back-office services," Dingman said.

The meetings were held at historic Merton College, part of Oxford University. F.I.M. CEO Françoise Emery and deputy CEO Damiano Zamana represented the F.I.M.'s executive team. The F.I.M.'s F.M.N./ConU liaison director, Nita Korhonen, organized the event with local support from A.C.U. CEO Matthew Edwards-Wear and his staff.

We are having a planning session coming up 18–19 October.


It's really important that all members who can, show up for this meeting to share ideas and suggestions, to help better this organization to continue in the state of Oregon.

Motorcycle rights and safety in Oregon have rested on three pillars for the last few decades – *A.B.A.T.E.*, *Team Oregon, and BikePAC*.

Why were these three groups were formed?

- A.B.A.T.E. (A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enact-ments) came about in response to federal blackmailing over highway funding if states didn't enact mandatory motor-cycle helmet requirements, they would lose significant amounts of government money. (Taxpayer dollars.) By organizing into a large state-wide group, riders had more political clout in the state capitol.
- *Team Oregon* was formed after early members of *A.B.A.T.E.* would drive around the state with a motorcycle in the back of a pickup showing riders tricks for safer riding. One goal was to reduce injuries and deaths caused by bad riding techniques, removing a justification for requiring helmets.
 - And BikePAC (motorcyclist

political action committee) came into being to provide trained people in the state capitol who knew how to use the political system to our best advantage.

Now we are faced with losing one of our principal pillars, *BikePAC*.

Why?

Lack of participation by motor-cyclists.

What will this mean when the next full session of the Oregon legislature meets in 2027?

Any bills curtailing rider rights will go largely unopposed.

- Do you like being handed the nozzle at gas stations so you can fill your tank without slopping fuel all over or dinging the paintwork? That could go away.
- Like yer apehanger handle-bars ? They could be taken away from you.
- Want mandatory sissybars or body armor? Tough. There won't be any way to stop such legislation from going through.

Maybe it's going to take the loss of our previous legislative victories to get motorcyclists fired up enough to participate in regaining our lost rights and to gain new ones.

But do we really want to go backwards? It's a lot of unnecessary work.



pages from our past . . .

This is part two of four from state legislative director Bear's report on the 2000 Meeting of the Minds conference.

The next general session was *The Role of State Legislators in the Global World* with Mark Buckner moderator. On the panel was representative Bob Laterno from New Hampshire, senator Kirk Allard from Illinois, and senator Dave Zien from Wisconsin.

One of the better general sessions was Working Together on Global Issues This was divided into two topics The European Threat and The UN and Globalization of Motorcycle Standards Can the Rider's Voice be Heard? with Erwin Reunite and Bob Tomlins, the acting general secretary of F.E.M.A. [Federation of European Motorcyclists' Associations]

In his opening statement Erwin said global harmonization would impact motorcycling, the strictest standards will be the world's standards, and all motorcycle market will he affected. He talked about the European Standard Bike, who wants the global standards for motorcycles? And what are the possible effects to motorcycling?

The multi-directive of E.U. [European Union] standard motorcycle was adopted in April 1997 and *is* in effect in Europe today. The reason Europe is setting the standard is 1,000,000 new motorcycles are sold there and only 300,000 in the U.S.

What market do you think manufactures are going to respond to the most?

Some of the issues that *F.E.M.A.* addressed, and the one according to *F.E.M.A.*, which will he the #1 target area, is **noise**. Air-cooled bikes cannot be quieter than 80 db.

This is why you will see a liquid cool [Harley–Davidson] in the next 18-24 months. H-D must meet this 80 db standard if it wants to keep selling motorcycles in Europe.

Another issue was anti-tampering. *F.E.M.A.* fought it and was able to keep anti-tampering requirements off of big bikes, but had to compromise the 50–250 cc size bikes.

What this means is the owners of these smaller motorcycles can not change sprockets, tires, or [perform] tune up's that will give them a 10%, increase in performance. This is an area after-market manufacturers need to be involved [in] because if they don't, they won't lo be around in 15 years,

There was a 100 HP limit provision, which was struck down for the time being.

One thing though – by [regulation] these standards must be revisited every five years. Who knows what will happen next time?

Motorcycle manufacturers have volunteered to lowered top speed from 192 mph to 180 by this year and down to 150 mph by 2005, the same as automobiles.

Will there he a horsepower limit in the near future?

Another area of concern is air pollution. *F.E.M.A.* was successful in delaying second stage catalytic converters. As you know catalytic converters are used on all cars presently manufactured. but the tougher emissions standards for bikes would have meant putting on motorcycles a catalytic system that would have driven the price of motorcycles up 15%. We the buying public need to force motorcycle manufactures to come

up with a system which meets E.U. emission standards but doesn't drive up the cost of a new motorcycle.

Another area was tires. Certain motorcycle manufacturers wanted the [regulation] to reflect only original equipment manufacturer. The tire that came with the motorcycle would be the only possible replacement. *F.E.M.A.* successfully argued not all weather or riding styles could be met by one tire, so for now replacement tires can be whatever type the rider wants. This prevents a monopoly of a few tire manufacturers.

Who wants the global standards?

The largest car and motorcycle manufactures do.

Why you ask?

As it is now motorcycles need to be approved for emissions and safety for each market. Developing a new model motorcycle is very expensive. Ask *Harley–Davidson*. They have to manufacture 257 different models of the 18 bike lines they presently produce. It costs a lot of money when you times the cost of development by the product line.

Having one set of standards all motorcycles manufacturers must comply with can save a company a lot or money. In simple terms, profits. Stockholders or manufacturing companies will now set how your motorcycle looks, performs, and costs – not you.

The other part of the session was The United Nations and Globalization Of Motorcycle Standards – Can The Rider's Voice Be Heard? with Bob Tomlins.

Bob pointed out some of the international organizations which work for globalization are:

• World Trade Organization



- United Nations Economic Commission for Europe (UN/ECE)
- Working Party 29

The European Union, United States and Japanese governments led the way in pushing for globalization.

We must. understand how the shrinking world affects us.

As the world becomes smaller through communication and travel, this will allow international conferences, research, and synergistic relationship [with] others to develop.

Some of those who will get involved are safety professionals. Already several countries have introduced new ways to approach motorcycle safety (such as Sweden's *Zero-Vision*) and the research in leg protection, air bags, clothing, and helmets.

This *Zero-Vision* is a Swedish doctor's idea. It's aim is zero deaths /serious injuries.

To achieve this you could only go a maximum 20 mph in urban areas and a maximum of 45 mph out in the country.

It also requires the use of an intelligent transport system. The Swedes admit bikes are not compatible and bikes should be banned for use by the general public.

To date there has been no full political debate, but some or the ideas may possibility be adopted. It has been accepted by the Netherlands and Norway.

From what I understand about this concept, is it will be very expensive to implement, yet we may see parts of it in safety programs. page **16**

IT IS HEREBY ADJUDGED AND DECLARED that Oregon House Bill 3422 means that as long as a motorcycle rider is wearing a protective covering on his head that has a hard outer shell, pudding adjacent to and inside the outer shell and a chin-strap retention system with a sticker indicating that the motorcycle belinet meets standards established by the United States Department of Transportation the rider is in compliance with state law with respect to his helmet and a police officer may not inquire further to determine if the helmet worn meets United States Department of Transportation testing standards.


